Juliann M. Brunzell serves as a criminal justice specialist for the Battered Women's Justice Project. Ms. Brunzell has over 32 years experience in sworn law enforcement both as a patrol officer and state special agent. Her expertise includes conducting domestic violence and sex crimes investigations, coordinating state, national and international training conferences on violence against women crimes, and implementing programs and research on the impact of women in law enforcement.

Laura Goodman is currently the Director of Public Safety at St. Catherine University where she is responsible for the safety and security of the nation's largest university for women. Previous to her current position she was the Deputy Chief of Police for the Brooklyn Center Police Department. During this session, participants will review current data about domestic violence crimes, nationally and specific to New Mexico, and including information about demographics, prevalence and lethality. Participants will also be guided to identify the numerous constraints – system-created, batterer-created and life/culture-created – with which victims are dealing when a criminal case is pending, and how advocacy and supportive services can enhance the roles of law enforcement and prosecution. – *Juliann Brunzell, Sandra Murphy, Karen Wyman*

10:15 – 11:45 **Investigation of Domestic Violence**

In this two-part session, participants will identify effective measures for responding to and investigating crimes of domestic violence, while prioritizing a victim-centered approach that incorporates risk assessment and safety planning with victims along with assessments of self-defense and predominant aggressor. Faculty will share new practices for follow-up investigations and victim engagement throughout the criminal process, including effective means to identify and address victim intimidation tactics used by batterers. Participants will also learn of recent legal challenges to successful evidence-based prosecutions and how to identify and use “forfeiture” evidence to improve – *Juliann Brunzell, Sandra Murphy, Laura Goodman*

Sharon Pino, former Governor’s Domestic Violence Czar and now Violence against Women Resource Prosecutor at the Attorney General’s office, will speak on the latest legislative changes related to domestic violence, including the amendment to the household member definition in the Family Violence Prevention Act. This session will also address federal Full, Faith and Credit laws and effective local and state practice for the enforcement of orders of protection. She will address both civil and criminal methods of enforcement and best practices for law enforcement professionals. - *Sharon Pino*

Most practitioners know that not all DV in this same – some situations represent greater dangers to victims, children and law enforcement than others. In this session, participants will explore how an understanding of the context of and surrounding a violence incident can improve their response to DV cases. “The Domestic Violence Specialist Officer Concept” Most law enforcement agencies in NM face fiscal concerns and can not assign a full-time investigative unit to DV in their communities. In smaller police depts., the responding officer is tasked with the sole responsibility for all aspects of a DV call. – *Lt. Bonnie Blanco-Montoya and Det. Julie Jessen*
